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What Castlecrag Means to Me

Four local residents made moving statements on "what Castlecrag means to me" at the St Johns Church Community Service on 4 June. Joan McRuvie's statement is presented here as she has left us after 33 years in The Crag. We hope to bring you other statements in future issues.

When asked to express what Castlecrag means to me, the word that immediately comes to mind is "beauty". Here the loveliness of our native flora has been preserved and regenerated and encouraged to co-exist with urban living in a way which is said to be almost unique anywhere in the world.

I love the graceful gum trees, the mysterious banksias, the timid wattles and their ilk. I love their subtle colours, their perfume, their gentle swaying in the breeze. I love the birds they shelter and the lizards that scurry beneath them. It is almost unbelievable that only 10 minutes away from this pure air and this calm is the roar of one of the world's great cities.

But the beauty of Castlecrag is more than just physical. There is also a beauty of spirit. People in Castlecrag talk to each other. They like each other. They are kind to each other. And for the most part they are kind to their environment too. I feel a great gratitude to the people, both past and present, who have laboured top preserve our natural heritage for us and for the generations to follow. And now it is great to that see many young people, including new residents, have been inspired by their example and are joining Bush Care classes, prepared to make their own contribution to what makes this place so special.

This beauty of spirit, this kindness, this feeling of Community is especially evident here in this lovely Church of St James. Here again we thank God for the lives and the example of those who have gone before. They have endowed this place with beauty for us. We may all have differing views on many matters – and that's healthy – but what joins us together is our passionate belief that the love of God is for all men, not just Churchgoers, not just for the believers, but for absolutely everyone.

Dear Editor,

A comment on the article about invasive bamboo by Harold Spies in the March/April issue of *The Crag* newsletter.

This company (*Mr Bamboo*) has successfully eradicated running bamboo for Willoughby Council using the cut and paint method. After years of trying various methods of eradication of invasive bamboo, it was largely from discussions with Castlecrag residents that we arrived at the method we

now use successfully. The method is illustrated on our website: www.mrbamboo.com. au

Timing is everything. One person is required to cut the culms, another to paint Roundup onto the cut surface. The whole grove should be treated in one operation. To enable the herbicide to be effectively located to the rhizome, the plant should be growing vigorously at the time of treatment. There will be minor regrowth and this is treated in the same way. Rather than hiding the neighbour with running bamboos, urban gardeners could consider clumping on non-invasive species. There are many small and medium-sized clumping bamboos suited for urban landscaping.

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My Street!

What is the impact of individual developments or "improvements" on the streetscape? Are Council's existing development controls adequate to protect the character of our suburb? What can I do to preserve the character of my street?

These are some of the issues that emerge from concerns expressed by Castlecrag residents to the Progress Association. These concerns include:

- erection of high and obtrusive fences • that are out of character
- large dwellings with height, • bulk, massing and proportion that dominate the streetscape
- garages that dominate the . street and obstruct public views
- destruction of significant . trees
- USE Of materials and COl- Will a future Castlecrag look like this?

ours not compatible with the bushland setting

Willoughby Council has enacted a Heritage & Conservation Development Control Plan (DCP) to guide the future development of conservation areas, including the Griffin Conservation Area. Most of the remainder of Castlecrag is designated a scenic protection area under the Local Environment Plan (LEP). The controls of the DCP cover the scale of buildings, their setting, landscaping, carparking and fencing.

> Despite these controls, obtrusive and out-of-character structures continue to be built. The present controls are inadequate, nonconforming developments are being approved or both are occurring.

Willoughby Council is seeking to address these concerns. A revised fencing policy is shortly to go on

public exhibition and other issues are being examined.

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The June meeting of the Castlecrag Progress Association will provide a public forum for residents to discuss these concerns and to contribute their ideas on the desired character of our streets and suburb. Please come along.
