

THE ZENITH THEATRE, CHATSWOOD

We have reason to feel proud of our new theatre provided by the Zenith Development Corporation, their contribution to the community. One of our residents, Mr Ron Pritchard, is the managing director of this firm. The theatre will be owned and operated by Willoughby Council, and will complement the Civic Centre by providing for live theatre in the evening and by acting as a conference centre during the day.

Costing \$2.5m to complete, this luxurious theatre has a 250 seat auditorium, large hospitality areas, full-scale rehearsal hall, dressing rooms, workshop, etc. and will cater for both professional and non-professional performing arts groups. To cater for the preparation of morning and afternoon teas, lunches and suppers, a fully equipped kitchen and servery is included. It is expected that the revenue from the use for conferences and seminars during business hours will enable cultural events to take place at an affordable cost to the community.

Displayed in the foyer of the Zenith Theatre during the opening performances were essays submitted by high school students, expressing their hopes for the future. These essays have now been deposited in a 'time capsule' and sealed into the theatre foyer to await reopening in the year of Australia's Tricentenary. One of the accepted essays was written by Kirsten McKillop, a Castlecrag student, of Willoughby Girls' High School.



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
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
A Message from David and Beverly Blacklock

USEFUL NATIVE PLANTS AROUND THE CRAG

Native plants are useful because they are so easy to maintain. They preserve that special character of Castlecrag 'bushland' and provide an important habitat for local birds and animals. Some however can also provide a special culinary surprise. One that is presently fruiting is the Lilly Pilly. There are three main species in Castlecrag; one, Acmena smithii is indigenous (born here) and the other two have most probably been planted by whitefella, Syzygium coolminianum and Syzygium luehmannii. All are nice dense glossy evergreen trees, good for shade and screening and very hardy. One story goes that the Lilly Pilly fruit was the first fruit sampled by Captain Cook's party in Botany Bay (how's that for a Bicentenary tit bit). Anyway a very good one to sample for those first tentative native plant forage forays is the small Syzygium luehmanii in the traffic island opposite the hospital (the island with the sculpture in the middle). Only a small tree, it bears masses of small red pear shaped fruit that are very tasty 'au natural' but also make an excellent jelly preserve if you can spare the embarrassment of standing on a ladder in the middle of Sortie Port picking the fruit. Next time you're up that way (and no one is looking) try them. You may be pleasantly surprised, but be quick because they won't be there in March.

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INNISFALLEN CASTLE

The Progress Association has reasserted its opposition to the development of the property around Innisfallen Castle. Eric Kaye, vice president of the Progress Association, has made a presentation to the public inquiry relating to the new proposal by the owners for the surrounding area to be developed into eight dwellings. The submission included the following objections:

- (a) We consider the Castle in its garden setting and adjacent County Open Space bushland to be a significant historical and architectural feature of great regional importance. This was strongly supported by the action of the National Trust in placing the Castle on its register in 1983.
- (b) The historic, social, architectural and aesthetic character of the property is derived from the building within its setting. The most inspiring views of the Castle and its grounds are obtained from the Northern Escarpment of the Castlecrag Peninsula and from the lookout at the Harold Reid Reserve, covering an arc of approximately 120. In our opinion the construction of the proposed dwellings would severely degrade the standing of the Castle as a part of our national heritage.
- (c) In 1975 when Interim Development Order No.15 was gazetted, we understood that one of the conditions required the building to stand in a clear area of not less than 2 acres (0.8ha), to prevent unsympathetic development detracting from its aesthetic qualities.
- (d) We fully support the action of Willoughby Municipal Council in 1967 of purchasing three properties in Willis Drive, between the Castle grounds and the foreshores bushland reserve to Sugarloaf Bay, thus ensuring the visual integrity of the total area.
- (e) Willoughby Council has applied strict Development Control Plans to both Castle Cove and Castlecrag, with the intention of ensuring that new development is in sympathy with the existing environment. We support this policy and consider that it must be applied in this case. In our view, the proposed development is prohibited under IDO No.15.
- (f) The existing grounds of Innisfallen Castle constitute a significant area of urban bushland (this was originally required to ensure retention of its character and scale with the surrounding bushland). In this respect it is considered that the proposal in its present form does not address either the impact of the development on the bushland both within the curtilage and outside, or the objectives of the State Environmental Planning Policy (SEPP 19).
