
Following the success of the 2001 Community Fair, residents were anticipating a similar event last year, but the uncertainties surrounding public liability insurance prevented our holding an event in 2002. We have secured insurance cover for the forthcoming event and an enthusiastic committee has planning well in hand.

The Fair serves to bring the various community groups and businesses in our suburb together. Local community groups will again conduct stalls in the car parks adjacent to the Griffin Centre and an expanded range of food and drink outlets will be available.

Activities commence at 10am and will continue through to 3pm. Entertainment will again be provided on a stage at the site, with music, poetry reading and other attractions.

The Progress Association committee has agreed that any

profits from this (and former Fairs) will go to a project initiated by Willoughby Council to restore the Griffin memorial fountain in Edinburgh Road to operating condition.

The Crag newsletter has provided regular updates on the history of the LATM proposals since 1975. Including descriptions of the current proposals in the October 2002 (No. 144) and February 2003 (No. 145) issues. Now that the designs have been marked out, Council officers will be undertaking further consultation with local residents to gain their views.

The proposed works are the result of extensive community consultation in the early 1990s by a Council-initiated LATM committee, including large public meetings. A Residents' Survey in 1997 highlighted traffic issues as a major concern (*The Crag* No.118). Traffic management consultants were employed by Council in 1998 and, following extensive consultation with the community, their recommendations were placed on public exhibition in April-May 1999.

DA Notification Process

Further to *The Crag* No. 145, the Progress Association made comment on DCP 27 covering the processing and notification of Development Applications (DAs). We complimented Council on its efforts to enhance the objectivity, equity and transparency of the DA process through improved procedures. Together with the Federation of Willoughby Progress Associations, we commented favourably on the proposed differentiation between developments of differing magnitudes in DCP 27, as this would allow a more rigorous assessment process for large developments. The Federation proposed that applicants should be responsible for listing all non-compliant features on their DA so that these can be

included in notifications. Moreover, it recommended that if the information provided was incorrect or incomplete, then the application should be rejected and the applicant should bear the costs of any re-application. It was submitted that this principle would greatly speed up the processing of DAs.

DCP 19 Heritage & Conservation

Council is revising DCP 19 covering Heritage and Conservation, including the Castlecrag Griffin Conservation Area, and this is currently on public exhibition. Written submissions will be received up to 23 May 2003.

Civic Place Project

Willoughby City's new Civic Place is now moving into the final planning stage for this very significant and exciting project, with the Civic Place Masterplan going on public exhbition

The Civic Place Masterplan is a visionary and achievable proposal for a vibrant, inclusive and sustainable cultural and recreational heart for the community of Willoughby and for the North Shore. It promises to be a public domain of quality and functional excellence in every sense, the "heart and soul" of Willoughby City. The proposed new facilities are two superb levels of terraced open space, a 5000m² Library, 1000 seat concert hall, 500 seat theatre, multipurpose hall, rehearsal spaces, meeting rooms, 460 car spaces, cafes, restaurants, retail spaces and a boutique hotel.

The Exhibition will be situated in the foyer of the Civic Centre, 409 Victoria Avenue Chatswood, from April 22 until September 2003. Willoughby Council's Streets to Creeks—Sailors Bay program aims to help prevent pollution and protect our bushland, creeks and the waters of Sailors Bay. Since its launch in February, the community

has shown great interest in the program, with good attendances at the bushwalks, spotlight walks, family activities and talks on wildlife and gardening.

Clean Up Australia Day was a great success, with many people joining the 1st Sailors Bay Scouts, Earth Ministry and 1st Northbridge Scouts at different sites across the catchment. School students have been involved, with Northbridge Primary and St Philip Neri School creating an environmental performance and floating sea sculptures. Others have participated in the *Streets to Creeks* community projects, with enthusiasts from the Haven Amphitheatre performing water-inspired poetry, and residents creating postcards with stormwater messages.


2003 Heritage Week

Castlecrag's Heritage Week activities on Sunday, 13 April attracted large numbers of visitors to our suburb. Various heritage groups provided stalls in the top car park near the Griffin Centre shops, while the Walter Burley Griffin Society did brisk business selling tickets to a range of walks exploring the historic and modern features of Castlecrag.

The guided walks attracted over 300 visitors. Professor James Weirick led the first of his two specialist Griffin walks at 10am, while short *Introductory Griffin Walks* and *Exploring Griffin's Castlecrag Walks* set off at regular intervals from 11am. A new attraction was a series of walks exploring the work of some of Australia's most celebrated modern archiects. Led by Eric Sierens, Stephen Davies and Ben Gerstel, these walks looked at houses by Peter Muller, Harry Siedler, Bill Lucas, Phillip Cox and Alex Popov. All the walks were aided by an outdoor photographic display of historic prints of Castlecrag, many of them by Max Dunain

The committee of the Griffin Society and its energetic president Andrew Kirk deserve congratulation for all the hard work required to organise such a successful day.

The Haven Amphitheatre hosted *Sailors Bay Concertos* by the Willoughby Symphony Orchestra and poetry reading by local residents from 12.30pm.

History of Castlecrag: Part 5

1928 The GSDA produced a **promotional film** of the Griffin estates at Castlecrag, entitled *Beautiful Middle Harbour*. This is available on a video from FilmSound Australia, *Keepin' Silent*, which features a selection of classic Australian silent films.

1928 The GSDA brochure, Castlecrag Homes: scenic marine suburb Middle Harbour states that the reserves and pathways of the Griffin subdivision 'are designed to perpetuate the delightful rambles which were a feature of Castlecrag before its development.'

1929 At a meeting with officers at Willoughby Council to discuss the Castlecrag estates, Griffin detailed his design principles for the conservation of 'our greatest asset, the pristine beauty of the landscape'. The objective for the design of fences was invisibility, while natural growth thickets were favoured for general screening.

1929 The **Ivanhoe Private School** was run by Mrs Walter Trinick at her home in Sunnyside Crescent. Certified by the Department of Education, it operated until circa 1933.

1929 The most celebrated of the Castlecrag Griffin houses, the *Fishwick House* at 15

The Citadel, was built. The client was Thomas W Fishwick, a representative of John Fowler & Co. of Leeds. Built on a wedge-shaped block in The Citadel, it presents a forbidding narrow façade to the street, but has panoramic views to The Spit. Another Griffin-designed house was constructed for Roy and Beryl Wilson at **2 The Barbette**. Ray Wilson was a salesman for the GSDA and the design of the house expresses much of the idealism of the community. It demonstrates a linear house form favoured by the Griffins, with the living room at one end. The octagonal living room with its massive fireplace has frequently been used for play readings and other cultural events.

1929 Sir George S Beeby purchased the Griffin-designed *Felstead House* (158 Edinburgh Road) and moved to Castlecrag with his family. Beeby had been a leading figure in the rise of the Labor Party to power in New South Wales, becoming Minister for Labour and Industry in 1910 and introducing a new Industrial Arbitration Act in 1912. He established a centrist Progressive Party in 1913 and in 1920, he was appointed a judge of the Industrial & Arbitration Court. Beeby was also a prominent playwright and his interests made him and his family active members of the Castlecrag community. The large living areas of the *Felstead House* made it a popular meeting place for the community group, Neighbourhood Circle, in the late 1930s and 1940s. Beeby's son, Edward represented Griffin in the Rivett case and his daughter, Doris Isobel, joined the Spanish Relief Movement during the civil war and was a prominent workers' advocate in Australia after the War. She died at Castlecrag in 1948.

1931 In an **Arbor Day ceremony**, residents helped the Griffins plant 250 eucalypts along Edinburgh Road, augmenting 1500 trees and shrubs already planted by the Castlecrag Progress Association.

1933 An architecture student at the University of Sydney, **Nancy Price**, completed her BArch thesis 'Walter Burley Griffin'- the first scholarly investigation of Griffin's life and work.

1934 The Haven Scenic Theatre (now called Haven Amphitheatre) was designed by Walter and Marion Griffin as a stone-tiered amphitheatre for community plays, and built by Bim Hilder. The site has perfect acoustics and the bushland setting provided (and continues to provide) wonderful scope for creating realistic stage effects. The first production, in September 1934, was *The Mystery Drama of Eleusis* by Edouard Schuré, directed by Marion Griffin and Lute Drum-

mond. Drama festivals were held until World War II.

1934 The last Griffin house built in Castlecrag, the **Duncan House**, was completed at 8 The Barbette for Frank and Anice Duncan. The original house was very small combining panels of knitlock with stone corner piers, and with French doors integrating the house with its surroundings. The Duncans were active in community life and were keen bush walkers.

1935 The Willoughby Incinerator was built in Naremburn to the design of Griffin and his partner Eric Nicholls for the Reverberatory Incinerator and Engineering Company, providing a new technology to cope with Willoughby's waste disposal problems.

The building is regarded as the best surviving example of Griffin's industrial work, a marvellous architectural composition which makes maximum advantage of its hillside setting. Willoughby Council has received acclaim for saving and restoring the building and it is now listed on the Register of the National Estate.
