Marguerite (Rita) Kaye: 1917-2003

Marguerite Elizabeth Kaye, a resident of Castlecrag for nearly 60 years and a former editor of *The Crag* newsletter, passed away in August 2003. She is survived by her husband, Eric, her daughter, Barbara, four grandchildren and six great-grandchildren.

Marguerite, affectionately known as Rita, was born at home in Paddington on 3 July 1917. After living in various houses in Sydney's east, Rita's family moved to Northbridge.

It was here she met Eric Kaye and they were married on 21 February 1942. They always had a great love for the outdoors and their honeymoon was spent bushwalking from Bungonia down the Grose Valley to the Kangaroo Valley.

Rita and Eric purchased a block of land at 325 Edinburgh Road in 1948, an address that would remain theirs for more than 50 years. In this post-war period materials were in short supply so the construction of their family home took a number of years. However, many, many wonderful

memories were created at 325 Edinburgh Road.





Lew Levy 1914-2003

A number of Castlecrag residents attended the funeral of Lew Levy on 11 September.

In 1925 Lew Levy's parents made the lifechanging decision to leave England with their three young children to make a new life in Australia. The family lived in the eastern suburbs, where Lew attended local schools and showed an academic capacity which was to set in stone an unending search for and enjoyment of knowledge. He met his wife Anne in 1938 at a play group he and his brother had set up; they married and moved to Moratai Crescent in Castlecrag in the 1940s and had three children, Kate, Sandra and Peter. After war service Lew completed an engineering degree and worked until his retirement at CIG. He then worked as a consultant with CIG and undertook a B.A. (Hons) degree.

Lew had an acute political awareness and was an active participant in and supporter of causes for the betterment of mankind.


Our Bushland Heritage

While the previous issue of The Crag highlighted the problem of vandalism, or at best thoughtlessness, in Griffin Reserves, there are positive stories too. Restoration of The Buttress Reserve has been achieved through careful consultation and planning, hard work and financial contributions of adjoining residents working with Council's bush regenerator, Pamela Batters - a lovely Yorkshire lass.

Over the past five years Pamela's skill and sheer, hard physical work has transformed a devastated, bamboo-infested wasteland into natural bushland complete with a dry, rock-lined creek that solves adjoining neighbours water run-off problems. Before planting was commenced all immediate neighbours were consulted extensively on the scale and form of flora so views would not be impeded and plantings were limited to those that would not exceed 6 metres.

The destruction of her caring, considered work was devastating and almost destroyed Pamela's motivation to continue, but I am pleased to report that she was back on the job in The Buttress Reserve this week, removing invading weeds and continuing her good work for the benefit of our community. We are indeed fortunate to have such a motivated person working for us, and she deserves our support and vigilance in nurturing and protecting Castlecrag's very special and unique bushland heritage.



History of Castlecrag: Part 7

1944 Portions of Warner's 'Waratah' dairy farm were subdivided. Warner's Estate No.1 is located in the suburb of Willoughby, while No.2 extends from Edinburgh Road, south side, to Sailors Bay Creek. Dairy sheds were located on this land up to 1938.

1946 Castlecrag children began attending East Lindfield Public School.

The Cumberland County Council 1946 (CCC) was formed to oversee the future planning of Sydney's metropolitan area. The proposal for the Express Route from Manly to the city was taken up. In accordance with conventional thinking of the time, it was assumed that existing roads would be upgraded and used where possible. The Councils of Willoughby, North Sydney and Manly recommended a route along Strathallen Avenue, Eastern Valley Way, Edinburgh Road and then a bridge from Sugarloaf Point to Seaforth, while the CCC favoured a route along the foreshores of Northbridge and across the bluff at Seaforth.



1948 The CCC plans for the City to **Manly Express Route** were placed on public exhibition in March. Willoughby Council objected to the Northbridge route and, on 7 June, formally requested that the Castlecrag route be adopted.

1949 In response to a request by the Minister for Local Government, the CCC dropped the Northbridge route for the City to Manly Express Route, leaving the Castlecrag route, which became known as the Warringah Expressway. The proposal to build the expressway along the northern escarpment of the Castlecrag peninsula and across Middle Harbour by a bridge off Sugarloaf Point caused dismay and outrage in the Castlecrag community. The Progress Association, led by its president Eric Nicholls, led 200 irate ratepayers to a Willoughby Council meeting to protest against Council's support for the route. It also presented a petition with over 1000 signatures opposing the proposal to the Minister for Local Government. It was the beginning of a long battle to protect the natural environment of Castlecrag from ill-conceived development.

1950 Another of the projects that the Progress Association had fought long and hard for finally became a reality when the Castlecrag Infants School was officially opened on 30 June with Una Puxley as its first teacher. It had been established as a result of community action and it was to become a centre of community life, with practically all the children of Castlecrag commencing their education in the kindergarten and Years 1 and 2 classes at the school.

1951 The Castlecrag Community Library, housed in a new wing at the Community Centre, opened on 3 November. It had been formed at the annual meeting of the Community Circle in 1947 and a committee comprising Joan Stanton, Mrs Brett Hilder, Bim Hilder and Mrs and Mrs Walker set about the establishment of a free library. It was established under the Castlecrag and East Willoughby Cooperative Society. Pat Case was appointed as part-time librarian in July 1951, while Ernestine Claridge and Manfred Souhami catalogued the

collection according to the Dewey system. The library is now a branch of the Willoughby Public Library, staffed by volunteers. Long-service librarians included Beryl Small, Rita Kaye, Joyce Batterham, Addie Saltis, June Jones, Hade Spiegal, Anne Thomas, Billy Hume and Dorothy Fraser.
