THE GORE HILL FREEWAY & THE WARRINGAH FREEWAY.

It is less than two years since Mr. David S.. Kirby presented his report to the State Government on the Warringah Freeway. This stated in part:-

*The Inquiry recommends against reinstatement of the former Warringah Freeway Corridor.
*The inquiry recognises that there is merit in a proposal for a link road connecting

Warringah Freeway with the Eastern Valley Way. This corridor should be no wider than is necessary to accommodate an arterial road.

*The massive interchange proposed at the confluence of the Warringah Freeway, The Gore Hill Freeway and the former extension of the Warringah Freeway to Seaforth should be abandoned. A more modest intersection preferably at ground level and intruding as little as possible into Hallstrom Park should be designed.

The Minister for Public Works, Mr. Laurie Brereton announced recently that the Gore Hill Freeway would go ahead late in 1986. At meeting of Willoughby Council on Monday 25th March last, officers of the D.M.R. addressed Council on details of the plan. Whilst I support extension of the existing F2 Freeway to Pacific Highway and Epping Road, to overmee the completely inadequate termination at Willoughby Road, I do have misgivings at me aspects of the D.M.R. proposals. In particular the configuration of the two carriageways to be contructed, with considerable separation (66m.) and at different levels (approx. 10m.) so that should a furure intersection be required at this point this could be easily constructed. I questioned Mr Dunstan on the need for this separation and reminded him that in giving evidence at the Kirby Inquiry the D.M.R. had stated that the Warringah Freeway "Would be unlikely to be given priority for funding before the century and even after," and in a further statement they said "The Department of Main Roads does not envisage building the Freeway in the corridor this century".

I also pointed out the large number of houses(and rateable properties) which would be needlessly lost for the whole of this century in the crescent shaped strip of land 800m. long between the carriageways, for a freeway which might never be built. Mr. Dunstan in reply agreed and made these points that I feel our residents should heed:"The Government has not yet accepted the Kirby report, and even if they do, a future Government could have a different policy."
Willoughby Council resolved to place the plans and a model of the proposed interchange on public display and to hold a public meeting within 3 months, before forming any decisions on these matters. Invitations will be extended to the Minister, the Local

I strongly urge Castlecrag residents to inspect and study the exhibition and to attend the meeting. I shall speak further on this matter at the Progress Association meeting on 30th April, 1985.

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH PROGRAMME

We were gratified by the number of people who attended the inaugural meeting of the Castlecrag Neighbourhood Watch Programme (over 100 residents and visitors from adjacent suburbs). An excellent presentation was made by a team of five Police Officers, led by Chief Superintendent Laurie Poulten, who referred to those who participate in the scheme as the "eyes and ears of the police". The discussion indicated that the optimum size of a group was 600/800 homes. Over 30 residents volunteered to take part in the implementation of the scheme and they will meet at the Community Hall on Thursday 11th April, for their initial briefing.

A further meeting will be held in St.James Hall on Monday 29th April, when information on all aspects of crime prevention will be discussed. It is hoped that this will be well attended.

Supper was served by the committee at the end of the meeting, and the opportunity was taken by residents to discuss the scheme with the police and to meet new neighbours. The number of people who joined up as new members demonstrated strong support for our Progress Association. We would like to thank the Police for their support for our Progress Association. presentation, and our committee for the time and effort spent in organising the meeting, especially our President, Dianne Street.

The CONSERVATION SOCIETY will be including a series of articles on Bushland Management in future issues of THE CRAG. As an introduction we reprint a statment written by the Director of the Royal Botanic Gardens, Dr. Lawrie Johnson and Assistant Directors, Dr. Barbara Briggs and Don Blaxell.

"May we appeal to those who care about the bush <u>not</u> to plant trees (or anything else) in it, Such planting makes it impossible to know, in the future, what is a natural occurance and what is not. Genetic variation between localities is obscured for all time.

Forestry operations include much planting and aerial seeding. State Forests are no longer reliable as representations of tree distributions before European settlement, but little can be done about that. Other authorities have also planted native species outside their natural ranges, or from seed sources remote from the immediate vicinity. Most such plantings, for instance on roadsides, are quite unnecessary and arise mainly from a desire to be seen to be doing something.

The "Greening of Australia" campaign does include provision for encouragement of natural regeneration but much of its message has been that "trees are good, therefore it is good to plant them" anywhere irrespective of the fact that planting may entirely spoil some of our landscapes, and obscure what is left of the natural record.

Native plants, including trees, will regenerate when natural seed sources are available given a chance and some patience. If there is definitely no seed source close enough for natural re-growth, planting should be from seed gathered as close as possible to the site, and should not include species that did not grow on the site ('species enrichment' is out unless the area is intended to be non-natural').

Judicious weed removal may be necessary, as may campaigns to stop and reduce human induced eutrophication (increase of soil nutrients). Eutrophication may destroy by building up populations of attacking insects, as in the so called "die-back" - more properly "chew-back" - of eucalypts near fertilized pastureland in New England. It may be equally destructive by enabling vigorous growth of nutrient-requiring weed species, as with privit (Ligustrum spp.) near Sydney or the choking by weeds of sand-plain species near fertilized farmlands in Western Australia.


Planting will not overcome eutrophication. It is seldom necessary in any area where the aim is to retain or allow natural restoration of native vegetation.

Please thinkbefore you plant - and then, usually, DON'T. Help or simply allow natural regneration instead - and educate councils, public authorities generally, and service organisations along theselines."
