His support is deserved as Eric and his wife Rita love this area and work hard in our community.



At its last meeting the Castlecrag Progress Association unanimously endorsed me as their candidate for the forthcoming Council elections. I thank members for this expression of confidence, and consider it appropriate to briefly outline the policies which I have pursued over the past seven years and the principles, which, if elected, will guide my future decisions. In each issue of <a href="Incomparison of the Crag">Incontribute a written report and make a verbal report at each Association meeting. I believe that local communities are becoming increasingly aware of the impact of Council decisions on their quality of life, and quite reasonably demand greater public accountability from their representatives. I have always held myself available to all residents either by phone or visit. In requests from residents which for some reason I cannot conscientiously support, I see a clear duty to fairly represent their points of view to Council, and in such cases I tend to seek compromise solutions to the problems.

I hold the view that to effectively represent electors, aldermen should involve themselves in municipal as well as local activities. During my period as an alderman I have been Deputy Mayor for two years, chairman of the building committee for three years, and chairman of the joint Northside Libraries committee (Shorelink) for three years; I am a member of each of the 530A committees responsible to Council for the management of the Castlecrag Community Centre, our Haven Ampitheatre, the Willoughby Youth and Community Centre, and a member of the management committee of Willoughby's newest theatre, the Zenith Centre, Chatswood. I am also a director of the Willoughby Retirement Community Association, concerned with the welfare of the aged in our communities.

I fully support the restoration and protection of our bushland from both adverse development and environmental degradation. Willoughby shares with Kuring-gai, Warringah and Lane Cove, some of the most ecologically unique and beautiful bushland in Sydney. This is particularly so of the upper Middle Harbour region. One fine vantage point to appreciate the beauty of this area is from the lookout at Harold Reid Reserve. I would recommend to those residents who have not already done so, to view Sugarloaf Bay and the surrounding area from this excellent reserve. Council is becoming increasingly aware of the value of our bushland. Five years ago I was appointed chairman of a committee set up to consider our policy on Bushland Management, which recommended that consultants: bе as Council's Fox and Associates engaged recommendation was adopted and I am pleased with the improvements which have followed. Very pleasing, too, is the excellent program of restoration and regeneration which WEPA is carrying out in the Sugarloaf Bush Regeneration Project, between Sugarloaf and Sunnyside Crescents.

A corollary of my support for our bushland is my concern for the possibility of the extension of the Warringah Freeway through Castlecrag. In my view this is one of the most important issues facing our suburb. I was elected to Council in 1980 when Willoughby and four other north shore Councils were attempting to convince the Kirby Inquiry to recommend retention of the freeway corridor, thus permitting later completion of the freeway. It was, and still is, my sincere conviction that such a policy would not only ruin Castlecrag and its magnificent bushland, but would make worse the traffic problems of Willoughby and encourage development of Manly and the Warringah Peninsula along the lines of the Gold Coast. I have maintained this stand at every opportunity at Council.

I have not attempted in this report to list issues which I have successfully supported or those which I have lost. There are many improvements I wish to see in Castlecrag and for which I have fought. However, funds for these are in competition with projects which Council considers to be of a more general and pressing nature, such as the swimming pool/leisure centre and the construction of Victoria Mall. One pleasing decision which has been taken recently, concerns

the land on our northern escarpment. Much of this is owned by the DMR. It has been neglected over the years and because of its northerly aspect, and until recently because of effluent from septic tanks, it has been decreed a bushfire hazard. DMR have agreed to spend \$13,000 over the next four years to hand clear lantana and bamboo from this area as part of the hazard reduction program. Council will continue clearing its land in accordance with its Bushland Management Policy. In addition, Council's consultants are meeting with residents to advise them on methods of reducing the fire hazard on their own properties.

Seven years ago I joined Council feeling I owed this to Castlecrag. My wife and I have lived here most of our adult lives. Our children were brought up here, and it is here that we will spend the rest of our lives. My former work has taken me to many parts of the world, but there is nowhere else I would rather live. I am proud to have had the opportunity to represent our municipality, our ward, and in particular our suburb, for the past seven years. I consider I have the ability to continue this representation for a further four years. To this end I invite your support on polling day, 26th September.

## LANTANA - ITS IDENTIFICATION, OCCURRENCE AND REMOVAL Harold Spies, President Castlecrag Conservation Society

Most of us recognise lantana and regard it as one of the main problem weeds invading our native bush. The plant originated in South America and many forms of it were developed horticulturally in Europe.

Identification: Lantana is a rambling shrub up to a metre high, although in rainforest gullies the canes may climb 15-20 metres up trees. The shrubs have prickly stems and the leaves are pale green with slightly rounded toothed margins. The flowers are compact heads of several individual flowers. The fruit, green berries, turn black when ripe. There are two species, the most common one Lantana camara, and Lantana montenidensis, a lower shrub with purple flowers. The green fruit has been known to be poisonous to children.

Occurrence: Lantana, like privet and other common weeds, is abundant on nitrogen-rich soils and is found along water courses, creek banks and behind houses bordering bushland where garden and household rubbish has been dumped. Again, like the other weeds mentioned in previous issues of The Crag, lantana because of its extensive shade cover and its invasive growth, prevents germination and growth of native seedlings and plants and gradually eliminates those already in the area.

Removal: Lantana is not a difficult plant to remove. Expose and cut the roots 15cm or so below the main stem and remove the surface roots. Lift the cut stem so that it is not in contact with the ground (eg, place it on a stone) and leave it to die, or cut up the whole plant and use it as mulch. Cut pieces in contact with the bare soil may sprout but these can be easily removed when checking the mulched areas. If the main stem is very thick, it can be cut and poisoned with 'Roundup'.

Benefits: By removing lantana from your land you will prevent it spreading into the nearby bush. You will also be assisting in restoring the bush to its native state. Easier access to our reserves will allow their enjoyment by people who wish to walk in and experience the bush; the whole community benefits.
