Despite a hard-fought election campaign and the support of most of the residents of Castlecrag, Eric Kaye was unsuccessful, by a narrow margin, in obtaining re-election to Willoughby Municipal Council.

Eric has been a tower of strength in representing Castlecrag on Council for the last seven years and the community is now without a resident alderman on Council to pursue local issues.

During those years Eric was ably assisted by his wife Rita, and a small but enthusiastic group of local residents, without whose support Eric's job would have been so much more demanding.

On behalf of Castlecrag Progress Association I would like to express our sincere thanks to Eric for his dedicated work for the residents and environment of Castlecrag.



To the 1158 friends and residents who gave me their primary vote in the local government elections on 26th September, to the 40 friends and members of our Progress Association who worked so hard delivering pamphlets and canvassing for me on election day, to my grandchildren and particularly to Sue Randle, my campaign director and President of our Association, Rita and I express our sincere thanks. Your loyalty, generosity and well wishes have overwhelmed us.

As you will now know, my nomination for re-election was unsuccessful, and I am very disappointed that I no longer represent you on Council. The reality of the situation is that for the first time in forty years (when Edgar Deans was elected), Castlecrag does not have an alderman resident in our suburb. This implies no suggestion that our three ward aldermen will in any way neglect the needs of the community, however I consider that Castlecrag has problems and needs unique to this area, and similar to Middle Cove.

For those interested in the statistics of the election and the subsequent allocation of preferences, I submit the following comments. Six candidates contested the three vacancies in Middle Harbour Ward, and the total primary votes cast were:

Noel Reidy	2400	John Squire 566
Pat Reilly	1162	Tony Biddle 538
Eric Kaye	1158	Eric Berry 375

The quota or minimum number of votes required for election was 1550. Noel Reidy was the only one to reach this on first preferences. He had allocated all his second preferences to John Squire and when they were transferred John Squire picked up 709 votes. I picked up 56 and Reilly 48, making the progressive total at that time:

Squire 1275
Kaye 1214
Reilly 1210, each of which was still short of the quota.

The second preferences of Berry and Biddle were then counted and transferred. These strongly favoured Reilly making the progressive total:

 Squire
 1351

 Kaye
 1285

 Reilly
 1983

Thus Reilly reached the quota and was elected.

Reilly's second preferences were next distributed making the final figures:

Squire 1448 Kaye 1367

Thus I lost the contest by 81 votes.

Swings against sitting members in any election are a fact of life. The last time the three candidates in our team faced the electors was seven years ago. Relative to then, in this election Noel Reidy's primary vote was reduced by approx. 22%, John Squire's by approx. 50%, and mine by approx. 16%. I consider these swings to be very high and to sound a warning for the future.

The decisions of Local Government have a direct influence on our quality of life. To me, a disappointing aspect of this election, as for the 1980 election, was that only two thirds of the residents eligible to vote, did so. I hope a greater percentage will participate in the voting in four years time. In the meantime this places on our Progress Association the responsibility to ensure that Council is kept fully informed on issues of concern to our community.

Rita and I will contine to be involved in community work, but intend to take a holiday before getting started again.

Finally, I shall borrow from the writings of an empire which knew more about the government of locals than even Willoughby Council, 'Sic Transit Gloria Mundi'.



A LETTER TO OUR ASSOCIATION FROM CASTLECRAG INFANTS SCHOOL

Dear Mrs Randle,

I write on behalf of the Castlecrag Infants' School P&C Association regarding a matter of road safety.

The pedestrian crossing in Edinburgh Road outside the Infants' School is used by children of all ages. Recently a concerned neighbour reported the number plate of a motorist travelling fast and failing to give way to three of our small pupils in the crossing.

Speeding and driving on the wrong side of our narrow roads is very dangerous. By drawing the attention of residents to these matters and seeking their co-operation it is hoped that our suburb will be a safer place for both pedestrians and motorists.

I have written in <u>The Crag</u> a number of times drawing the attention of residents to this dangerous situation. Some years ago when we had our grandchildren living with us, I was on a roster of mothers supervising the crossing and accompanying the children across. I found this a harrowing experience, cars travelled so fast around the corner that I feared some small child would be hit. The school has made several attempts to have the location of the crossing moved further from the corner, thus giving drivers approaching the crossing from Eastern Valley Way, more time to see the children. We have not been successful in having this change made. These crossings are the responsibility of the Road Traffic Committee, a body comprising the DMR, the police, UTA, the Local Member, and Willoughby Council.

Our narrow winding roads are very picturesque, however they too can be very dangerous for children walking to and from school; great care needs to be taken when driving along them. I urge you to discuss these problems with your family, your neighbours and your friends, in an effort to impress upon all that responsibility for the road safety of our children is in our hands.


