To Nick Hughes who planned and coordinated the event, wrote the script and directed the performance; to Mrs N Miller, Principal of the School, who gave such generous support; to Lindy Batterham and the Carnival Organising Committee which comprised Lindy. Marcella Cerna, Mark Crew, Adrlenne Kabos, John Llewellyn, Sue Randle and Kate Westoby, who worked so hard for many weeks to make the day a success; the 44 performers; the six musicians; the six puppeteers who manipulated the puppets of Walter and Marion Griffin; and to the large number of residents who made the costumes and provided or assisted with the preparation and serving of food: on behalf of the members of our Association and hundreds of residents and friends who attended. I extend our sincere thanks.

We were pleased to welcome many notable people, among them John Spender, Federal Member for North Sydney; Robyn Read, State Member for North Shore; Andrew Refshauge, Deputy Leader State Opposition; Ted Mack, Former Mayor of North Sydney; Noel and Mary Reidy, Mayor and Mayoress of Willoughby; Aldermen J Clantar, J Jorgenson and P Reilly.

The event was funded by grants from the Australia Council and Willoughby Council. The Progress Association thanks these bodies for their support. In a letter to our Association referring to the performance, Deborah Mills, Director of the Community Cultural Development Unit of the Australia Council, says in part, '...this important event...is both a celebration of your unique and beautiful community and a rallying point for those of you who are fighting to preserve it. Community art is about people doing things together to make changes that as individuals would be impossible. Through art, the Castlecrag Carnival project is communicating to others the values, ideas, dreams and visions of the Castlecrag community in a way which can help bring about change. The vital and energetic residents of your area possess what many other areas throughout Australia are striving for -

an awareness and understanding of their community and a sense of identity, pride and purpose. These fine words express the spirit of the day far better than I could.

Two important aspects must be mentioned. The first is that many young people in our community received such valuable training from the very high standards set by the professional performers, and the second, that the event drew together all groups of residents working in our community. These include church, sports, environmental, cultural and youth groups. More than 100 people were actually involved and nearly 1,000 attended and enjoyed the day.

Rita and I foined the Progress Association during the 1950s and with the exception of a few years when we lived overseas have always been enthusiastic members. In this period covering more than 40 years I am proud to have been President or Vice President on many occasions, and for seven years your Alderman. However, the time has now come for me to step down from the position of President and at the 65th Annual General Meeting next year I will not seek re-election.

Between meetings the work of our Association is largely carried by members of the Committee. In my time I have seen many fine, enthusiastic and hardworking committees, and without a doubt the present team ranks with the best of them. The need now is for a younger person to take over the job of president.

Progress associations are an important part of a democratic society. They provide a necessary link between local communities and their council. This is well recognised by Willoughby Council. This is particularly important at the present time when councils are coming under increasing pressure from the State Government to Lower their standards. Such a situation occurred recently in North Sydney. The Minister for Planning without consultation with either Council or residents, had substantially altered a Local Town Plan. A public meeting of Council and over 500 outraged residents forced the Government to withdraw these alterations. In Castlecrag, problems such as overdevelopment, the proposed

school closure and the renewed threat of the construction of the Warringah Freeway, demand constant vigilance by a strong progress association.

At the first meeting of our Association held on 10th November 1925, chaired by Edgar W Herbert, our constitution was adopted; this stated in part 'the object of the Association shall be to do everything to further the interests of the district of Castlecrag'. This is still our most important objective. As I look at Castlecrag today, I feel that those present at the first meeting 65 years ago (and they include Walter and Marion Griffin) would have been generally pleased with the way our community spirit has been maintained, if not completely satisfied with some of our urban development.

Finally, I wish all of our friends and members a very happy Christmas and New Year.

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THE FIGHT FOR CASTLECRAG SCHOOL CONTINUES

The Department of Education has advised the Principal that a skip and packing cases will be arriving at the school shortly. Already the Principals from neighbouring schools have gone through and labelled the materials and equipment they want. We have been denied any say in that matter at all. One would think that for example, the photocopier that was bought from parents funds could go to our local library but no, all property belongs to the Department. The P & C has written to the Department insisting that the Minister's promise (that the children not be disrupted by the closure) be honored and that no packing, or signs of packing should be evident during the school term. The children are sad enough about the closure, without being confronted with that.

GREEN BANS AND PICKET LINES.

We remain determined to seek justice for this community and for our young children in particular. The only way this can now be done is by maintaining a physical presence in the school grounds over the holiday period to stop the removal of equipment and the dismantling of the buildings. We have gained the full support of the Union movement with a "Green Ban" on the site. The agreement is that as long as there is strong community support by way of a physical presence, they will not cross our "picket line". The chances of the Government contracting non union labour is, however, high.

It is for this reason that we will need to maintain a 24 hour roster with a minimum of two adults (and hopefully their families) at any one time. We urgently need to borrow a caravan. We will have a mobile phone and a network so that fifty people can be called in at five minutes notice. If we remain determined, stand together and persist we will win in the end. The media and the community at large will support us. We have received letters of support and encouragement for our stand for justice from all over Australia.

The Government seems to be under the misapprehension that they have been given a mandate to sell off our assets in an attempt to buy votes in the west. Although they have now announced that they will consult with community groups and conduct Environmental Impact Statements with regards the sale of public assets, they also seem to believe they are beyond the proper processes of consultation with our community and our elected Council.

THE ZONING ISSUE.

Willoughby Council (to their credit) have refused to rezone the land. The State Government will now probably try to rezone the site to allow up to sixty four units to be built. Our legal advice however is that there is no power to rezone the site in order to make money; the making of money out of the sale of public land is NOT a town planning objective or an environmental planning purpose. The Minister (Hay) cannot make such a plan and the Government will find itself in Court for a breach of the Environmental Planning and Assessment Act if it tries to rezone the land.


HOW YOU CAN HELP.

DISTRICT COURT APPEAL

Attempts to gain access to documents relating the closure through the Freedom ofInformation Act have been met by beauracratic coverups and political interference. We have charged exhorbitant rates and denied This access to many relevant documents. is in respect to a decision that was supposedly made in our best interests. have read in the Sydney Morning Herald documents leaked from the Department denied to us) revealed that Naremburn Milsons' Point schools were on the (and denied original list of schools to be closed, but because of the North Sydney by-election those were taken off the list, and along with Balmoral Beach Infants



were substituted. In our quest for the truth, we have appealled to the District Court against the Department of Education's refusal to give us access to these documents. The hearing will be on 13th December and we will be represented by two leading Q.C.'s. Interested community members are most welcome to attend.

WHY WE ARE DETERMINED TO GAIN JUSTICE

The State Government is continuing to act against the best interests of our community by persisting with the selling of our school. This is despite full enrolments of 82 for 1990, and demographic data which shows an increase in the 0-4 age group across Eastern Willoughby. Parents have spent a very active fourteen months trying to defend the school's right to exist but have constantly been met by a brick wall mentality. Not once has the Government shown us the respect of giving us the opportunity to intelligently discuss the issue. Our local member has treated the region with contempt and will I'm sure, find himself in for a big shock next election. On more than one occasion Peter Collins dishonered an appointment between parents and Mayor Reidy to look over the grounds to discuss the ideas involving extended usage of the site.

The Environmental Education Centre Proposal did not receive the proper hearing it deserved; the report that was eventually received from the Regional Director did not address the concept and was full of inaccuracies, just like their demographics.

Our demand now (which is also whole heartedly supported by John Spender MP) is for a moratorium on the school closure and an independent committee of review to examine all the facts.
