Congratulations are also in order to residents Max Dupain and Leonard Teale on their Australia Day Awards.

On the Australia Day weekend, the residents of Sunnyside Crescent once again held a 'street party' which residents brought along food, drink, barbeques and picnic chairs and tables and enjoyed a few hours relaxing and chatting to their neighbours. The children 'had a ball' riding on their bikes, skateboards and roller blades in the safety of the closed-off section of the Crescent. I believe the residents of The Parapet had a gettogether as well - did your street? If only more residents could talk and reasonably discuss problems as they arise, such as boundaries, fences, trees, noisy pool filters, illegal and inconsiderate parking, dogs barking, etc. our suburb would be a happier place. Honours for Castlecrag Residents

Castlecrag has reason to be proud of two of our residents who were honoured with awards this Australia Day. Max Dupain was made a Companion of the Order of Australia (AC) for services to the visual arts, particularly photography, and Leonard Teale was appointed Officer in General Division (AO) for his services to the performing arts and the community.

Max, who recently turned 80, became interested in photography when he received a Box Brownie on his fifteenth birthday. Since then, he estimates, he has taken a milion pictures. covering a wide variety of subjects, and portraying a history of Australia in photography. His long association with architecture has earned him an honorary membership of the Institute of Architects and his love of nature is expressed in his book Australian Landscapes published in 1988. A copy of this book, presented by him to the Castlecrag Library, is on view there.

Max has always showed concern for our suburb. He was very supportive of our efforts to fight the freeway through Castlecrag, and to demonstrate just what would have been lost had such a freeway been built, he submitted an album of photos of Castlecrag to the Kirby Inquiry. Earlier in the 1940s when we published the book Castlecrag to raise funds for the landscaping of the Infants School, he provided the photographs which enhanced the publication. Recently Max handed his photographs of the Griffin houses to the Walter Burley Griffin Society.

Leonard Teale is highly regarded for his acting on television, the stage and on films. Among other parts, he played the lead in the television series *Homicide*. He also played the role of the father in *Seven Little Australians* (recently repeated on TV). Like Max, Leonard has been very supportive of Castlecrag activities, most recently the retention of the Infants School and the waterfront cottages. He has also been a big help in the presentation of Carols by Candlelight.

Jim Mason's many friends were sad to receive the news of his recent death. The Masons moved to Castlecrag in 1941 and soon became very involved in Castlecrag activities. When it was decided to build a Community Centre on the land reserved by Burley Griffin for that purpose, the Masons and others in the community worked hard to dig trenches, fence the area and build the first temporary shelter. The community combined to raise funds for the project, and Jim's contribution was a large array of beautifully made wooden toys, which were sold at a fair held on the corner of Eastern Valley Way and Edinburgh Road. The fine collection of wooden blocks still in use at the Castlecrag Kindergarten are also the work of Jim.

Another interest of Jim's was sailing, and he was regarded as an outstanding skipper. With his boat *The Caddence* he entered the 1963/4/5 Sydney to Hobart races, winning on handicap in 1966. During this time he also won the 1964, 1965 and 1977 Sydney to Brisbane races, an unequalled record of three wins.

Jim moved to Noosa, Queensland, in the late 1970s and took up farming, but he still kept in touch with his friends in Sydney. We express our deep sympathy to his family in their sad loss.

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

General Meeting

Tuesday 3rd March 8pm

Community Centre corner The Postern and The Rampart, Castlecrag

Following general business guest speaker Trevor Waters will speak on the Pyrmont Incinerator. Trevor is an architect and acknowledged authority on the Pyrmont Incinerator and has produced a written study and full measured drawings of the Incinerator. Trevor's talk and slides superbly illustrate the massed sculptural strength and the wonderful decorative face tiles.

Trevor will examine the influence on Walter Burley Griffin of Frank Lloyd Wright, Louis Henri Sullivan and Marion Mahony. He will also look at Griffin's effectual contribution to Wright's work whilst in the Oak Park Studio, and examine the difficulty in substantiating issues of influence when evidence is circumstantial and subjective. The validity of a designer's intentions can be neither proved nor disproved. However a consistent approach between the particular architectural expression of the Pyrmont Incinerator and its correlation with Walter Burley Griffin theories may illustrate the complexity of intentions. the Pyrmont Incinerator is discussed in relation to past examples in the work of Walter Burley Griffin.

Light Rail

Bob McKillop responds:

Mr Wheeler's letter reflects an old demand by motorists to alienate public space (i.e. streets) for their individual use, which originated in the 1920s and remained in vogue until the 1950s. The NRMA journal, Good Roads No.6 of 1924, claimed "[T]he spirit of the times is that of betterment ... good roads and the automobile point that way." The journal maintained a strong campaign against obstructions to the motorist on the roads, namely pedestrians, cyclists, horse—drawn vehicles and trams. Good Roads (10/1922) viewed trams in terms of getting rid of:

our present cumbersome, noisy, street—destroying steel—track cars and replace(ing) them with quick—running modern vehicles [buses and trolley—buses] that could usher in good roads and streets in cities and suburbs.

By 1952, the campaign had begun action to close the tram system, which was progressively eliminated over the next eight years.


Elsewhere, trams have evolved into modern light rail systems, with ultra-modern vehicles operating over their own reserved right - of - way to provide fast, efficient, pollution - free and quiet service. Light rail is the fastest-growing public transport mode in the world with over 100 cities in 25 countries constructing new networks or expanding existing systems. World-wide, progressive cities are turning to light rail as a high capacity, low cost public transport mode which is flexible and helps shape cities into an attractive, pollution free and sustainable environments for their citizens. In North America, the number of cities with light rail has increased from 8 to 17 over the past decade. The Coalition for Urban Transport Sanity supports the call by the Light Rail Association for Sydney to catch up with the rest of the world and introduce a modern light rail network before our living space is strangled by inefficient, space eating, polluting and noisy cars.

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Tennis – Castlecrag Sports Club Inc. (Cortile Reserve)

Vacancies for junior tennis players 9-16 years now exist. Two courts of synthetic grass are available. Play is supervised and begins at 8am each Saturday, going through to 11am. The morning is divided into sessions, varying according to the numbers present, but each is never less than one hour. Juniors may also play regularly on weekday afternoons when the courts are not let to midweek clubs, parental supervision can be arranged, and entry keys are available from Associates or Members. The available times are displayed in a window of the clubhouse. Senior juniors are not required to play under parental supervision but must have entry keys from an Associate or Member. The courts are alavailable to juniors on Sunday afternoons and during the week in conjunction with Associates and Members, if present. Players must rotate their sets between their own groups or as arranged mutually. Possession of a court shall not exceed half an hour while other players are waiting.

The Castlecrag Sports Club owes its existence to the late Walter Burley Griffin who made the land available and was instrumental in the construction of the first court (loam) in 1928. the Club is a non – profit organisation and all Committee members serve in an honorary capacity.

Preference in membership is given to residents of Castlecrag but not to the exclusion of others. By arrangement visitors may play subject to payment of the required fees. Waiting lists are maintained when applications for all categories of members exceed vacancies.
