COMMITTEE REPORT

CASTLECRAG PROGRESS ASSOCIATION.

The Executive Committee wishes to report progress on some items referred to in the last edition's report by the President.

Bus Shelter - 5 entries have been received. 4 of these have already been referred to the Council Engineer who advises that they appear to be suitable as regards construction. Hopefully, the entries will be judged by an architect, to be nominated, and the winning entry announced by the next General Meeting.

Proposed Northbridge Marina - The Government has decided to hold an inquiry headed by a Commissioner. The inquiry will receive written submissions over the next six weeks and a hearing will follow. Our association will be making a fresh submission and we hope that those who are interested will contact the Secretary or the President of the Association and offer comments.

Local Council Elections - Eric Kaye has been again endorsed as the candidate for our Ward, unopposed, to represent our Community, if elected, for the next four years.

The Executive Committee also reports that an application has been submitted to Council for proposed additions and alterations to the Castlecrag Private Hospital. The Association was asked by Council to make a formal submission should there be objections to the proposal. A submission has been made since by the Association objecting about the degree of increase in size, also the traffic and parking problems in Sortie Port, and the traffic safety in Edinburgh Road, close to the infants school.

REFLECTIONS ON THREE YEARS IN COUNCIL.

Since my election as your Alderman, I have reported in each copy of the CRAG on resolutions of Council affecting our community. The Progress Association has endorsed me for a second term and because of this I see an obligation to report on my past three years in Council. Let me start by saying that I have enjoyed the work and found it rewarding, though it has proved to be far more time consuming than I had expected. Willoughby Council is non party political. I would not consider continuing if this were otherwise. Local Government is very close to the people and decisions made by Council should be on merit alone. The policies on which I was elected three years ago were primarily:

1. To oppose the construction of the Warringah Freeway and to seek a better

solution to Willoughby's traffic problems.


To work for the conservation of our natural and historical environment.

To support orderly and purposeful development of our Municipality.

I have fulfilled these promises to the best of my ability and have always made myself available, to discuss with residents their problems, and to adequately represent their case to Council. Occasionally I have been involved in bitter argument to put my point of view in debate; sometimes winning, sometimes losing. When I have lost, which fortunately is not very often, my loyalty to the team demands that I respect the majority decision.

The Warringah Freeway Inquiry is completed and there appears little further we can do in this regard until the findings are made public. However the other policy matters are ongoing.

I have been appointed to a number of Council committees where I feel my previous training and experience provides a purposeful contribution and will continue with this policy. Finally, Noel Reidy, John Squire and I have combined to form a Progress Associations' team for Middle Harbour Ward., and we shall be seeking your support on September 24th.

MEMORIES BY DOUG CHANDLER.

The Chandler family have been part of Castlecrag for almost 50 years, moving here in 1937. At That time there were only six shops in Castlecrag, all on the southern side of Edinburgh Road, and Chandlers had two of them. One they used as a storeroom and the other as a mixed business. They sold groceries, vegetables, newspapers, comics and conducted the post office and an agency for the Commonwealth Savings Bank. On one side of them was the bakery, where our bread was baked in the ovens still to be seen in the Castlecrag Cellars. This was run by a Mr. Taylor and his son Billy, the bread was delivered by horse and cart. Present day conservationists would be horrified to know that Mr. Taylor cut down Casuarina trees to fuel his ovens, maintaining that the low gum content of this wood produced a good bread.

On the other side was Reg Medway's butcher shop. Besides providing our meat, Reg was the volunteer fireman, and was paid the princely sum of 10 shillings when called out to fight a fire. The other two shops were housed in a stone building, at one time the sales office for the Greater Sydney Development Assoc., and Walter Burley Griffin, later to become our first garage.

In a letter to the Crag, Doug Chandler records the following memories:-

"Eastern Valley Way was non existant; the road from Northbridge to Castlecrag as far as the creek was known as Eric Street. there was Warners' dairy and Chinese market gardens, finishing at Edinburgh Road. Lyle Street, ran from there towards Roseville, to the laneway which joins into Fourth Avenue and from there to Robert Street it was just bush. (contd P.5)

It was not until 1939 that Eric Street and Lyle Street were joined to become Eastern Valley Way.

New shops were built on the north side of Edinburgh Road in 1941/2 and the Chandler family took two of these, a greengrocery run by my brother Ces, who sold out during 1942 to join the army. In 1947 Mr. Chandler sold the grocery business and moved into the present location.

This is about all I can bring to mind, except that the area that is now the Bottleshop was first, to my knowledge, used by an off-beat American religious sect, then as an Air Raid post, and then as a Scouts Hall. Also, that Castlecrag was in those days a great place for a 16 year old youth to grow up in. Plenty of natural bush, fishing, swimming in tidal pools attached to unoccupied weekenders, oysters and mussels for the taking, and rabbit shooting on Warners' Dairy -- a real Utopia."

Many of us can remember with affection the old Chandler Couple, always referred to, even in our "first name" community, as Mr. and Mrs. Chandler. They continued with us until they retired, delivering our mail and groceries and minding our prams and old walking shoes when we made a trip to town. We were happy that it was Doug Chandler who took over from his parents, and now we have Vanessa, Doug's daughter, and her husband John, still carrying on in the old tradition.
